

The 2020 APVMA National Symposium will be hosted by Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine on February 28th and 29th 2020. This trip allows you to attend lectures, participate in wet labs, and meet other Pre-Vet students from around the country, and from other countries as well! A registration date will be posted soon, and reminders will be given as the date approaches.

Registration will be ~\$140, but the club will help cover some of that expense. If you're interested in going, payment due dates to the club are as follows:
